Caregiver Fulfills a Lifelong Dream to Attend the Opera in NYC

he women in Judith Bair's family tend to age well. Both of her grandmothers lived long into their 90s; her mother, Helen — who currently lives with Judith on her farm in Sinks Grove, West Virginia — is 101. Judith, 77, has been her mother's primary caregiver for the past decade. Although Helen is in relatively good health for a centenarian, she is bound to a wheelchair and needs constant attention.

Judith's day begins early and includes helping her mother get washed and dressed, ensuring she gets her medication and preparing meals for her throughout the day.

"My mom is remarkably healthy for a woman her age, but she can't really be left alone," Judith said.

According to *Caregiving in the United States 2015*, published by the AARP Public Policy Institute and the National Alliance for Caregiving, more than 43 million Americans provided unpaid care to an adult in the last year.
