The Complete Antarctica Packing List

Only a handful of humans get a chance to visit the frozen continent each year. If you're one of the lucky ones — congratulations! As you prepare for your once-in-a-lifetime adventure, keep this packing list handy so you arrive prepared and get the most out of your trip.

Clot	hing for Antarctica landings:	
	2 pairs of wool long underwear (tops & bottoms)	
	1-2 mid layers like a fleece jacket and/or wool sweater, and fleece pants, sweatpants or hiking pants, and a thicker pair of socks	
	1 outer layer like a lightweight down jacket	
	1 pair waterproof/windproof snow pants	
	1 waterproof/windproof shell: We recommend checking with your cruise line, as many cruise lines will provide a waterproof/windproof shell to wear over your lightweight outer layer.	
	Lightweight gloves for taking photos/warmer days; heavier waterproof gloves or mittens for colder days and tender boat outings	
	Warm hat or headband	
	Wool scarf or neck gaiter	
	Small, water-resistant backpack	
	Dry bag (if you plan to kayak)	
Clothing Aboard the Ship:		
	Bathing suit if your ship has a hot tub (or if you plan to do a polar plunge!)	
	Casual, comfortable clothes	
	Comfortable footwear like slippers and/or sneakers	
	Comfortable undergarments	
Pre-	Comfortable undergarments and Post-Trip Overnights:	
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	and Post-Trip Overnights: Warm weather clothing if you are staying	



Pro tip: Don't over pack!

Your journey to and from Antarctica will be long with lots of legs, so traveling light is recommended. Pack two base layers and enough "around the ship" clothes for half of your trip, and plan to do laundry halfway through. (Laundry is typically an extra charge but can be worth it to travel lighter!) We recommend one a small "personal item," a larger carry-on sized back pack and a small carry-on sized roller board suitcase. Check one of those bags on each flight.



O Do I need to bring cash?

Most ships will provide an ID card when you board that you should keep with you at all times. If you should need to purchase anything on the ship (alcoholic beverages, souvenirs from the gift shop, etc.), it will be charged to your credit card on file using your ID card. So, be sure to bring a credit card with you on your trip. But once you've boarded, you can leave your purse or wallet in your room! Depending on your pre- and post-trip location, you may also want to bring currency like Argentinian pesos.

	Prescription Medication: Bring sufficient medication to last through any unforeseen delays.	
	Seasickness Medication: Sea-Bands and seasickness tablets or matches for crossing the Drake passage	
	Sunscreen: We recommend SPF 30+ to protect your skin from UV rays reflected by the snow and ice	
	Moisturizer: The air outside and on board the ship can be dry and cold. Bring lotion and chapstick to protect your skin.
